Pope Francis reflects on Mary in these words: "Mary has always been present in the hearts, the piety and above all the pilgrimage of faith of the Christian People. 

Aims of the Program

The Diocese of Peterborough Rosary Prayer Program is a program supported by volunteers which is designed to help students *grow in faith through prayer*. Through participation in this program students will be invited to:

- Learn contemplative prayer
- Strengthen leadership in prayer
- Serve others through prayer



Volunteer Requirements

- 1. Photo ID will be provided and should be worn on all school visits.
- 2. A Criminal Record Check (with Vulnerable Sector Search) is required by all school volunteers. The original must be given to the school principal before your first visit.
- Dates and times of visits confirmed in advance with principal and will be communicated with teachers.



Rosary Prayer Program Continuum

The following continuum is provided to assist volunteers in their planning and to promote student growth and development in prayer.

Level	Outcomes	Curriculum Connections	Time
Kindergarten (JK & SK)	-Students will bless themselves with the sign of the cross and pray the <i>Hail Mary</i> .	Students will "give praise and thanks to God." (In God's Image Catechist Manual)	15 min
Grades 1-2	-Students will pray the <i>Our Father</i> , <i>Hail Mary</i> , and <i>Glory Be</i> (G1)Students will pray a decade of the rosary and begin praying the Apostles' Creed (G2).	Students will "learn to recite the common prayers of this living community" and "demonstrate an understanding of our profession of faith." (Religious Education Curriculum Policy Document Document, Grades 1-8, 75-77)	20 min
Grades 3-4	-Students will review all prayers and be introduced to the complete rosary (G3)Students will pray two decades progressing to five decades by the year's end (G4).	Students will "identify the unique prayer life of the Virgin Mary" and "appreciate the gift of the common prayers of the Church." (Religious Education Curriculum Policy Document, Grades 1-8, p103 & 106)	20 min - 25 min
Grades 5-6	-Students will review all prayers and pray a full five decade rosary every visit (G5) -Students will consider the Pope's explanation of each decade while praying the rosary (G6)	Students will "see that prayer is enriched by a variety of elements" and "use various means to enter into meditative and contemplative prayer." (Religious Education Curriculum Policy Document, Grades 1-8, p136 & 137)	25 min
Grades 7-8	-Students will pray a full rosary with the Pope's explanation on the mysteries. They will also pray the Hail Holy Queen at the close of the rosary (G7 & G8)	Students will "recognize that the Church has drawn upon many sources to assist Christians in prayer" and "understand that the Church venerates Mary the Mother of God." (Religious Education Curriculum Policy Document, Grades 1-8, p159 & 169)	30 min

Religious Education Program Connections

Prayer is an important pillar of Catholic Schools and of particular importance in the elementary school classroom. In outlining the most important teaching strategies for Religious Education, the *Religious Education Policy Document, Grades 1-8* identifies that:

"The Catholic Church has a rich history of prayer. Students should be introduced to and invited to participate in the many forms of prayer that have developed over the history of the Church including those that have developed out of our encounter with other religious traditions such as guided meditation and contemplative prayer. It should be noted that prayer needs to be invitational so as to respect religious freedom and the dignity of students who come from non-Catholic traditions; however, it is still a vital part of Christian formation and the school's participation in the Church's mission to evangelize the children we teach." (ICE, 21)

In alignment with this appeal to invite students to participate in contemplative prayer, the Grade 1-4 religion program, *'Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ'*, which has been fully implemented in PVNC schools, makes many connections with the rosary. It is instructive for volunteers of the Rosary Prayer Program to note some examples of these connections:

 In Grade 3, students are introduced to the prayers and mysteries for praying a complete rosary.

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- In Grade 1, students learn the common prayers of the Church: The Lord's Prayer, Hail Mary, and Glory Be.
- In Grade 3, students are led in reflection on the purpose of the rosary and the benefits of contemplative prayer.




Figure 3: Check-in questions in Grade 3 student book.

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 In Grade 4, students connect the Joyful, Sorrowful, and Luminous mysteries to scriptural references and are led in meditating on the life of Jesus.

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 Throughout the program, students learn stories of saints who are connected to the rosary and who are examples of contemplative prayer and meditation, such as St. Bernadette, St. Dominic Guzman and St. John Paul.

Institution of the Eucharist	"This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." (Luke 22:19)	at the Last Supper, Jesus invites His disciples and us to receive Him through the Eucharist.
