New headquarters for Grandview Children's Centre is happening

April 27, 2017, OSHAWA, ON – A new Grandview Children's Centre is on the way. While a formal announcement did not take place during Ontario Finance Minister Charles Sousa's budget speech, Grandview Children's Centre's CEO Lorraine Sunstrum-Mann said she and Board Chair Judy Robinson were told by government officials that a new Grandview Children's Centre is happening.

Both Robinson and Sunstrum-Mann were invited to the provincial legislature for the reading of the Ontario budget today.

"We have been assured that Grandview is in the budget," she said moments after leaving Queen's Park. "We will know more details surrounding this wonderful news in the weeks to come."

"We are thrilled and thankful that the provincial government has approved our New Grandview. The kids, families, staff and community have been working hard to make this project a reality. To the government and to the whole Grandview family we express our sincere gratitude. This is exciting for everyone and now the work begins on the next phase of the project."

Robinson went on to add "Grandview is thankful for the tireless efforts in recent weeks by local MPPs Joe Dickson, Tracy MacCharles, Granville Anderson, Lorne Coe and Jennifer French." Today's news means that Grandview will soon be able to bring this long-awaited project to fruition. The land has already been donated by the Town of Ajax in November of 2015. Working with the staff of the Town and the provincial government, Grandview will determine next steps including final architectural design, construction plan, budget and timelines.

Marilyn Robitaille, a Grandview parent with a child receiving treatment and another child on the waiting list, commented, "As a parent with children with special needs this announcement is absolutely amazing. I know firsthand what a positive impact Grandview has on our kids and their families. On behalf of thousands of parents, grandparents, siblings and our kids, I say 'thank you' for making this happen."

Grandview has a significant impact on the lives of children with special needs and their families. Grandview Kid Sam Keane, an adolescent client, was very excited. He said, "I'm so glad to know that more kids across Durham Region will be able to receive the vital programs and services of Grandview like I did. Grandview is an outstanding organization with amazing staff and great programs."

Grandview Children's Centre is the only facility of its kind in Durham Region providing expert paediatric assessment, treatment and rehabilitation services to over 6,000 children and youth with special needs. Close to 3,000 more kids are on a wait-list to receive service. Grandview's main facility in Oshawa was built in 1983 to serve 400 children. As the only children's treatment centre in Durham Region, Grandview's work has broad impact in our community, changing lives daily.

Minister of Children and Youth Services Announces the Inclusion of a Direct Funding Option in the New Ontario Autism Program

This is welcome news for families across the province who have been vocal about the need for a direct funding option under the new program.

Today's announcement from the Minister of Children and Youth Services regarding the inclusion of a direct funding option in the new Ontario Autism Program is a welcome one for **families who have repeatedly called for flexibility and choice to be a part of the new program**.

Previously, families of children receiving early intensive behavioural intervention (IBI) were given the option of pursuing either a direct service option, whereby they received intervention services and support directly from government funded providers, or a direct funding option, whereby families were able to hire their own private providers and receive reimbursement for these services from the government.

When the Ministry of Children and Youth Services announced the formation of a new Ontario Autism Program last spring, families were concerned that the choice between direct service and direct funding would no longer exist and they would be required to access services solely through publicly-funded providers. They were assured today that this will not be the case. Instead, **families of children will have the choice of how they access behavioural services for their children, regardless of age.**

Autism Ontario recently surveyed thousands of families across the province and asked questions about a range of issues relating to intervention and diagnostic services. When asked what funding option they felt would work best for their family, approximately **66% said that given the option, they would prefer direct funding.**





"When looking at the data we saw that families consistently reported the desire to not only choose their own provider, but the timing and location of services. For many, travelling to a service centre during work hours is an impossible task, be it because of their own job commitments, or because they live hours away from the nearest publicly-funded provider. With direct funding, they can hire someone to come to their house during times that work for the entire family. On the flip side, we heard from families who would prefer direct service. These families reported multiple concerns, including, being unable to manage acting as an employer – finding and hiring service providers, or that in this case, there are no private providers nearby that they can hire. Overwhelming families reported wanting <u>choice</u>, be it to manage and hire service providers themselves, or to access services directly from publicly-funded providers. The needs of all families must be respected."

In light of this data and our conversations with families across the province, **Autism Ontario strongly supports the inclusion of a direct funding option under the new Ontario Autism Program.** It is important that families are able to choose what option they feel works best for them. It is also paramount that families across the province are able to access services in an equitable way.

The current announcement pertains to behavioural treatment, yet we know from families that the range of services that individuals need over the course of their lifetime spans much further. **Children and adults with ASD need to be able to access many types of services, such as, speech and language services, educational supports, occupational therapy, mental health, employment opportunities with support and adult specific resources.** Autism Ontario hopes that accessing these many important and necessary services will becomes increasingly feasible for families across the province.

Dear Ms. Smigielski and Ms. Griespsma,

Thank you for your letter on behalf of the Peterborough Victoria Northumberland and Clarington Catholic District School Board and its Special Education Advisory Committee about special education funding. Please know that your commitment to students with special education needs is valued. I am pleased to respond to your letter.

Our government is committed to ensuring that every student has access to the supports they need to succeed in school, including students with special education needs. As a result of listening to provider, parents and students with special needs, we are making changes to be more responsive to the needs of all students and to increase our focus on supporting their achievement and well-being.

The Ministry of Education provides Ontario's 72 publicly-funded district school boards with additional funding through the Special Education Grant for students with special education needs to support the incremental costs of the additional programs, services, and equipment required to meet their educational needs and to support positive outcomes. This enables equity for all students with special education needs.

Special Education Grant funding is incremental to the Foundation Grants and other special purpose grants of the ministry's education funding model, the Grants for Student Needs. School boards have the authority and flexibility to use other Grants for Student Needs funding, as well as the Special Education Grant, to meet their responsibility to support students with special education needs.



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While the ministry is responsible for policy that directs the allocation of funding to school boards, it is the responsibility of the school board to allocate funding for each school or program, according to policy and priorities. Based on your current practices, I commend how the PVNC is helping to support the professional learning to respond to the needs of your community. Clearly you know their needs best and that is why flexibility in resource allocation remains with the boards because they are in the best position to determine local needs when setting budget priorities.

In 2017-2018 I am proud to share that the Special Education Grant is projected to increase to approximately \$2.856 billion in 2017-18. This represents an increase of approximately \$69.2 million (2.5 per cent) over 2016-17.

In the case of Peterborough Victoria Northumberland and Clarington Catholic District School Board, its total Special Education Grant funding allocation is projected to be almost \$21.85 million in 2017-18. This represents an increase of \$8.2 million or 59.5 per cent since 2002-03.

Special Education Grant funding is enveloped for special education programs, services and equipment. Any unspent special education funding must be treated as deferred revenue for special education.

In addition, as a result of the education sector labour negotiations, the ministry has agreed to establish a Local Priorities Fund (LPF) of \$218.9 million province-wide in 2017-18. The LPF will allow boards to address a range of priorities including more special education staffing to support children in need, "at -risk" students and adult education. Peterborough Victoria Northumberland and Clarington Catholic DSB is projected to receive over \$1.66 million in LPF funding for 2017-18. The actual staffing will vary depending on specific agreements, local discussions and compensation specific to each board, as well as job security provisions, staffing reductions related to declining enrolment and other exceptions.

As you know, the new DSENA allocation (formerly the High Needs Amount) was introduced in 2014-15 to better reflect the variation among boards with respect to students with special education needs, and boards' ability to meet these needs, thus making the DSENA allocation more fair and equitable. The new DSENA allocation uses three components to reflect this variation: the Measures of Variability, the Special Education Statistical Prediction Model and a Base Amount for Collaboration and Integration. Please note that the Measures of Variability contains a Remote and Rural Adjustment that generates more funding for boards such as yours. Ministry staff have consulted with stakeholders on the evolution of the DSENA allocation, and we will continue to do so over the 2017-18 school year.

While this transition to a more fair and equitable DSENA model is provincially fiscally neutral, it will have redistributive impacts among boards such as the Peterborough Victoria Northumberland and Clarington Catholic District School Board. To mitigate this impact the new DSENA model is being phased in over four years (2014-15 to 2017-18), and despite projected enrolment declines for some school boards, the ministry has held the provincial DSENA total allocation at \$1.05 billion from 2014-15 to 2016-17, the first three years of the transition to the new model. The DSENA Allocation is projected to be \$1.065 billion for 2017–18.

Thank you for writing to share your concerns and recommendations with me. Our government is moving forward in making improvements to the special education funding formula to be more responsive to the needs of students receiving special education programs and services and to increase the focus on supporting student achievement and well-being. Please be assured that I understand your concerns, and will keep them in mind as we move forward. I trust this information is helpful to you.

This is to inform you that this year we will be using the same process for school boards to develop and submit a Special Education Plan and report on the provision of their special education programs and services. The Ministry of Education continues to be committed to improving the achievement and well-being of students with special education needs and the importance of this plan and associated processes remains a priority.

Boards will continue to use the Checklist to report on the provision of their special education programs and services provided during the previous school year and provide a description of any variance, as necessary (see Checklist attached). Boards are to submit the 2016-17 Checklist, along with the URL to the board's publicly accessible 2017-18 Special Education Plan, to the ministry for annual review. In the event that the Special Education Plan is not available on the board's public website, boards continue to be required to submit a hard copy of their plan to the ministry.

Boards will submit the Checklist, and if necessary an electronic file or paper copy of the Special Education Plan, to the Regional Office by July 31, 2017.

As you are aware, special education planning is also included in the board improvement planning process focussed on improving student achievement. You are encouraged to continue consulting with your SEAC as you plan for the delivery of programs and services for students with special education needs through the development, implementation and monitoring of the Board Improvement Plans for Student Achievement.
