Background:

Presented for your information is a construction update report for completed/ on-going/ future activities within our various Schools/ Facilities for the 2020/21 fiscal year

Funding sources for the various projects include:

- Facility School Renewal funding annually allocated through Grants for Student Needs (GSN). This is an enveloped amount and any funds not spent in a particular fiscal year will carry forward to the next fiscal year.
- School Condition Improvement (SCI) funding annually allocated through GSN. This an enveloped amount and any funds not spent in a particular fiscal year will carry forward to the next fiscal year.
- COVID Resilience Infrastructure Stream (CVRIS) funding one-time allocation flowing from the federal/provincial governments on a series of projects supporting health and safety measures related to COVID. Substantial completion of these projects is required by December 31, 2021. Any funds not spent will be recovered by the government.

The projects listed below are in various phases of:

a) completed;

- b) in-progress;
- c) tendered; or
- d) in planning.

Background:

2021-22 Grants for Student Needs

The following memos have been provided by the Ministry of Education on May 4, 2021 to support planning for the 2021-22 budget estimates:

- 2021: B07 Planning for the 2021-22 School Year
- 2021: B08 2021-22 Grants for Student Needs Funding
- 2021: B09 Capital Funding for the 2021-22 School Year
- 2021: B10 2021-22 Priorities and Partnerships Fund (PPF)
- 2021: SB06 Special Education Grant and Mental Health Funding Changes for 2021-22
- 2021: SB07 Student Transportation Grants for Student Needs, 2021-22

These memos have provided some planning details, important announcements regarding intended changes to grant structures, on-going investments to reflect the third

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year of the labour agreements, changes to how online learning classes are funded, enhanced accountability measures, and on-going support related to operational matters supporting health and safety/COVID matters.

Board-by-board projections of the core GSN have been made available. As at May 4, 2021 access to the electronic financial estimates forms was made available, and the Technical Paper was published.

An overview of the major elements that make up the GSN:

- The 2021-22 funding to school boards is projected to increase to \$25.6 billion.
- The 2021-22 GSN reflects investments or changes supporting the Ministry's vision and direction regarding the following:
 - 1. Funding has been provided to support ongoing commitments made in prior labour agreements.
 - 2. Changes in class size: the benchmarks for funded average class sizes are being adjusted for Secondary to reflect the phased implementation of the new graduation requirement to take 2 online courses, where the class size is funded for 30.
 - 3. Transfer of funds previously identified under Priorities and Partnerships Funding (PPF) into the GSN for Technology Resources, Mental Health Supports, Specialist High Skills Major programs, and After-School Skills Development programs,
 - Recent Immigrant Supplement: time limited mitigation funding to help boards deal with the decline in recent immigrant enrolment as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic and closed borders.
 - 5. Student transportation funding has been maintained at prior years' funding levels with adjustments that reflect enrolment growth. School boards with declining enrolment will not see any negative adjustment. Inflationary increases to support contracts with bus operators have not been provided since the 2019-20 school year.
 - 6. School operations has had an increase to assist boards in managing the increases in commodity prices . At the same time, funding will be reduced on a phased-in basis to reflect the impact of change in class size at the secondary level.
 - 7. COVID-19 supports: Funding announced in August of 2020 to support technology-related costs and Mental Health supports will continue for 21-22 and will be transferred as an ongoing element with the GSN (see #3 above). Additional supports have been provided (outlined below in this report) however school boards are expected to budget for approximately half of the resources to support the first half of the school year. The ministry will confirm the use of the remaining resources, if needed for the second half of the year,

in the Fall pending vaccine distribution across the province and public health advice.

8. Use of Accumulated Surplus (reserves): school boards will continue to be allowed to access up to two percent of their operating budget from Accumulated Surplus (reserves) to support the safe operation of schools.

Enhanced Accountability Measures

The ministry will be introducing additional requirements to enhance reporting for library staffing, and new enveloping requirements related to Indigenous Education funding.

Courses at the Secondary level that generate funding based on enrolment in FNMI Studies must be fully utilized to run these programs, and the use of any funding surplus beyond what is needed to run these courses must be reported through the Board Action Plan. School boards are required to deliver these programs if a minimum of eight secondary pupils of the board enroll in the course. This reduces the flexibility of secondary schools to support other small sections/classes that they would like to offer, as well as reducing the flexibility of the Board to support other budget areas with surplus funds from this allocation.

Priorities and Partnerships Fund (PPF)

The initiatives outlined below are being prioritized under this PPF umbrella which is supplemental to the GSN and meant to support high impact initiatives that directly support students in the classroom.

For 2021-22 school year, the PPF will provide \$228 million in funding to education partners to support students. Approximately \$122 million has been confirmed to school boards to support Ministry priorities. Within this amount, \$60.1 million is allocated by program and by school board as of May 4, 2021 and 62.1 million will be confirmed later in the year.

Local Challenges for 2020-2021

Some of the inflationary costs and program pressures identified by administration have not changed significantly from prior years, but there are increased estimating risks due to the continued impact due to Covid-19.

• Managing the overall decline in enrolment: boards have been required to budget on a very conservative basis. This enrolment decline may be temporary, however no stabilization funding is being provided to mitigate for enrolment loss and as such reductions across the system will be needed to reflect the impact of grant loss if a balanced budget is to be achieved.

- Incorporating the new changes to enveloping and grant structures, combined with grant loss due to enrolment decline, has contributed to a structural deficit where balancing the budget will require reductions before consideration of the extra supports that have been provided for COVID-19.
- Continued pressure due to costs related to short and long term absences, including continued requirements regarding self-isolation due to the expected presence of COVID-19.
- Continued pressure in departmental budgets where price increases exceed the inflationary amounts provided by the government, particularly in Facilities and with Student Transportation.

Achieving a Balanced Budget for 2021-2022

The restrictions on how school boards may use certain components of the GSN allocation continues to expand. As at 2021-22, the following restrictions were contained in the GSN regulations:

- Budgets must be balanced
- Class-size regulation must be respected
- The Special Education Grant is limited to special education expenditures

- The allocations within the Targeted Student Supports Envelope of the Learning Opportunities Grant are limited for use collectively on its four programs.
- The allocations within the Experiential Learning Envelope of the Learning Opportunities Grant are limited for the use collectively on its three programs.
- The Library Staff Allocation is to be used to fund library staff
- The Indigenous Education Grant is limited to expenditures that support the academic success and well-being of Indigenous students, as well as build the knowledge of all students and educators on Indigenous histories, cultures, perspectives and contributions, including spending restrictions on specific amounts within the grant.
- The RNEF within the Geographic Circumstances Grant is to be used to further improve the education for students from rural communities.
- The Mental Health Workers Staffing Component within the Mental Health Workers Allocation of the Mental Health and Well-being Grant is limited to expenditures on regulated mental health professionals in secondary schools.
- New Teacher Induction Program (NTIP) funding is to be used for eligible NTIP expenditures which are required to meet NTIP program requirements
- School Board Administration and Governance spending shall not exceed the envelope
- The Program Leadership Grant funding is limited to salary & benefits and travel & professional development expenditures related to specific lead positions.
- The Indigenous Education lead amount may only be spent on Indigenous Education Lead. Any remaining funds must be reported and spent under the BAP Allocation.
- The School Renewal Allocation is primarily limited to capital renewal expenditures.
- The School Condition Improvement Allocation is to be used for renewal expenditures that are capitalized and address the overall state of repair.
- Capital funding is to be used for approved capital projects
- The Temporary Accommodation Allocation is to be used for portable moves, leases, and purchases as well as lease costs for permanent instructional space.
- Funding outside of the GSN through Priorities and Partnerships Funds are restricted to the details included in the associated Transfer Payment Agreements.
