Priorities in Action

Faith and Equity

The Board's Faith and Equity Advisory Committee brings together the voices of stakeholders in Catholic Education to advise senior administration and the board. The PVNC community provides an educational environment that supports diversity within the Catholic community with policies that adhere to the guiding principles of the Ministry of Education's 2017 *Education Equity Action Plan* through actions such as the school-based *Culturally Responsive and Relevant Pedagogies* inquiries which were articulated in 25 PVNC schools for the 2018-2019 school year.

PVNC recognizes the harmonious relationship between faith and equity which is identified in Catholic Social Teaching. The Compendium of Social Doctrine of the Church states that equity can be achieved only "when it is based on the respect of the transcendent dignity of the human person" (p. 132). Our chaplaincy programs, various retreats, multicultural, social justice, and ambassadors' clubs as well as groups celebrating the diversity of all students, continue to provide opportunities for students to reflect on ways that their stories and voices are heard and valued. In this way, the themes of faith, equity, and the inherent dignity of every person are kept at the forefront of all that we do. In particular, equitable achievement and access to possibility accompanies the journey of faith we undertake every day in pursuit of the common good.



PVNC builds equitable school and classroom environments where all students can have the opportunity to succeed. Deep Inquiry Learning allows for authentic exploration of student voice, inclusion and engagement for all students. The Ontario Catholic Graduate Expectations allow for educators to ensure students are developing their communication, collaboration, critical thinking and citizenship skills to better their communities in a complex, global world, always in the context of Catholic Faith.


Religious Education

PVNC was pleased to continue its full implementation of the *Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ* religious education program by providing resources and training to all Grade 5 teachers in 2018. Secondary religion teachers continue the implementation of the new secondary curriculum through collaborative inquiry, and are making meaningful connections between the Research and Inquiry strand and pedagogies for Deep Learning.

The Board is proud to continue to support parish-school-home Sacramental preparation meetings and resource sharing, which renew the spirit of collaboration between teachers, catechists and schools and parish leaders as they work with parents to prepare students for the celebration of the Sacraments. It was also a year of growth for the Rosary Prayer Program, which saw parish volunteers giving of their time in our Clarington schools. During the 2018-2019 school year, many classes and schools are also engaged in the regular practice of Christian Meditation, a form of contemplative prayer.

Mathematics

As collaborative learners, we continue to focus our professional learning on implementing a balanced approach to math instruction in order for students to develop their critical thinking skills. Using the Ministry of Education's **Focusing on the Fundamentals of Math**, PVNC engaged administrators, math mentors, special education resource teachers, integrated literacy program teachers, math curriculum chairs, school teams, parents, consultants, and supervisory officers in better understanding ways to support the math learning through their role.



As a result, our leaders have demonstrated increased confidence in facilitating math professional learning with their colleagues, understanding what to look for in a math classroom, and aligning assessment with instruction. Educators have a better sense of what to look for and listen for with respect to student strategies and key ideas. Classroom instruction is evolving to include questioning that uses all areas of the Achievement Chart (Knowledge, Application, Thinking, Communication) and triangulation (Conversation, Observation, Product) to assess students' understanding. We are committed to the use of Number Talks and Dot Talks that support the development of fluency skills where students communicate their mental Math strategies accurately, efficiently, and flexibly. Students are

demonstrating a greater awareness of the relationships between numbers and operations, collaborating more often, developing their critical thinking skills, and applying their learning through rich tasks. We also continue to engage more parents and guardians in ways they can support learning at home by sharing resources and supports through a monthly newsletter and links on our district's website.

Deep Inquiry Learning

In 2018-2019, more than 20 elementary and secondary school teams continued to embrace Deep Inquiry Learning that fosters cognitive, intrapersonal, and interpersonal skills. This initiative brings the Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations to life through deep learning inquiries as students and educators learn about, and live out, our Catholic Social Teachings. Through these authentic learning experiences, students and educators eagerly explore new ways to engage in learning, foster new partnerships, leverage digital technology, and adjust the learning environment to suit the needs and interests of students. These experiences culminate in a project that engages community partners in an action or initiative that creates a positive change locally.

Thousands of PVNC students have had multiple opportunities to participate in real world inquiries and are eager to act as leaders. Students are now guiding their own teachers and principals along the inquiry path. These same students have been invited to participate in professional learning opportunities along with their leaders, providing the wisdom that comes with personal experience.



Early Years Learning

The kindergarten program at PVNC is a child-centred developmentally appropriate, integrated program of learning for four- and five-year-old children. Our early years team, which consists of a teacher and a registered early childhood educator, work diligently to establish a strong foundation for learning, and do so through a safe and caring, play-based environment that promotes the spiritual, physical, social, emotional, and cognitive development of all children.

A focus for PVNC in 2018-2019 was to continue to implement Ontario's two-year **Kindergarten Program (2016)** and the Addenda updated this year. The program outlines how educators will support children's learning through unstructured and intentional play and inquiry. The kindergarten program provides a smooth transition from home or child care settings and a strong foundation for learning in the years to come. This focus on learning encompasses the whole child and includes religion and family life, literacy and mathematics behaviours, self regulation (social and emotional) and



well-being, problem solving and innovating and belonging and contributing. Together, these practices allow both educators and families to work with each child to reach their God-given potential.



Indigenous Education

Under the guidance of the First Nation, Métis and Inuit Education Advisory Committee, PVNC continues to learn from and about the Williams Treaty First Nations of Alderville, Curve Lake, Hiawatha and Scugog Island, on whose traditional and treaty territory we are located. Our schools are also enriched by our relationships with, and support from, the Peterborough and District Wapiti Métis Council and the Nogojiwanong Friendship Centre.

The annual Board Action Plan on Indigenous Education includes initiatives for supporting students such as funding to allow for Elders and Knowledge Keepers to visit schools, support student participation in Indigenous-led opportunities in the community, provide opportunities for student voice

through Indigenous Students and Allies Circles, and for special programs in schools like Walking the Path, KAIROS Blanket Exercise and TRACKS.

Each school has a First Nation, Métis and Inuit Education contact person who shares a keen interest in reconciliation with the staff and students of the school. Educator knowledge and understanding of First Nation, Métis and Inuit history, culture and world view is built through collaborative inquiries and other professional learning opportunities (e.g. Indigenous Cultural Competency/Awareness Training, Inuit Learning Day and Curriculum-specific professional learning).

One highlight of 2018-2019 was an Experiences Canada Cultural Exchange between 20 students and three chaperones from Holy Cross Catholic Secondary School and youth from the Gitxsan First Nation in British Columbia. Students spent a week in each others' communities building beautiful relationships and understanding of Gitxsan and Anishnaabe cultures and experiences.

Mental Health and Well-being

In the 2018/19 school year we continued to implement our **Be Well Strategy** throughout the PVNC system. To highlight this implementation, a presentation to the Catholic Parent Engagement Committee was made by Board psychologist Dr. Cynthia Chan Reynolds, Board Chaplain Fr. Paul Massel and Mental Health Lead Jennifer Angelo entitled *Be Well: Mind* • *Body* • *Spirit,*

at the strategy as we continue to build awareness, capacity, and a culture of mental health and well being from a holistic perspective throughout our school communities.

Through this work, we installed "Be Well Walks" in more than one-third of our elementary schools to support self regulation. In addition, a focus on resilience and skill development of students and staff continues to be implemented through **Christian Meditation**, Compassion Fatigue training and self regulation. In our work with School Mental Health Ontario, we have engaged in implementation of additional clinical skill development for Social Workers in the Brief Intervention for School Clinicians (BRISC) model and Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) to further support these initiatives.



Special Education

In the pursuit of equitable and inclusive learning within the common good, PVNC's **Special Education Plan** calls us all to learn, lead and serve. This year, we continue to build on practices that model tiered intervention in our special education services department and throughout our schools. We have shifted from large, centrally-based inservices to regional learning sessions for special education resource teachers in order to build staff capacity and allow for the sharing of best practices and the resourcing of services which vary from each region of the board.

Using an inquiry model of learning, we continue to build on the learning of our principals through case study and review of administrative procedure *Supporting Positive Student Behaviour: Safety for All.* In keeping with supporting the reading development of students with learning disabilities, we continue to offer the *Empower* remedial reading program, a research-based collaboration with Sick Kids Hospital.

We have newly-implemented two school-based autism programs in Northumberland and Peterborough and an after-school skills development program in Clarington, which we hope to expand next year to the other four regions of the board. Both new programs focus on improving social skills through specific social thinking and both represent innovative approaches to learning and teaching.



Skilled Trades

PVNC Pathways Planning and Supports

Our Board strives to promote all pathways, with a particular focus on apprenticeship and the skilled trades, to help students to make informed choices and to successfully transition to a postsecondary destination that compliments their choice.

Pathways Resources

Through teacher-supported student navigation of the Edge Factor and My BluePrint student pathway planning resources, PVNC students are learning more about careers suited to their gifts, are researching post-secondary avenues accordingly, and are building appropriate portfolios.



Experiential Learning

Grades 7 and 8 skilled trades-based experiential learning includes a hands-on project experience for all Grade 7 students, about 1,050 students, at one of our local colleges annually (Fleming College, Durham College, and Loyalist College). As well, we have been able to provide a hands-on project experience for all Grade 8 students, about 1,000 students, in the secondary school tech shops. These initiatives support student inspiration at a critical age and have resulted in strong numbers in secondary school technological education classes. Furthermore, PVNC continues to host a five-day summer welding camp in all four regions of the school board for Grade 7 and 8 students.

Specialist High Skills Majors

Over the past five years, PVNC has increased its SHSM programs from nine to 23 - bringing the total number of PVNC SHSM

students from 300 to 800. Most of the new programs are trades based. Presently we have five Construction SHSM programs, three Manufacturing SHSM programs, one Aviation SHSM program, one Transportation SHSM program, and one Agriculture SHSM program. Many of these programs work closely with a neighbouring Environment SHSM program to emphasize sustainable industry practices. Through the courses, co-op placements, and certification experiences of these SHSM programs, students interact with numerous representatives from industry who share their career journeys with our students. These can be particularly inspiring encounters for our students. PVNC presently has an SHSM footprint of over 30% and consistently sustains



an SHSM completion rate greater than 80%. SHSM students include those pursuing the workplace, college, university, and apprenticeship pathways.



Dual Credit Programs

PVNC staff are extremely grateful for Dual Credit opportunities for students and have supported, through staffing and time-tabling, an increase in Dual Credit programming in our schools. Across our six secondary schools, annual dual credits include Automotive, Electrical, Plumbing, HVAC, Sheet Metal Fabrication, Framing Techniques, Welding, Aeronautics, Renewable Energy Systems, Mathematics for Technology and Engineering, Culinary Basics, and Manicure Techniques. We are grateful to work closely with four local colleges including Fleming College, Durham College, Loyalist College, and Seneca College. PVNC consistently enrolls close to 100% of its funded Dual Credit Seats with approximately 98% of students successfully completing the college credit.

Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)

Approximately 25 Grade 12 PVNC students participate in the Accelerated OYAP program annually, which includes the Level 1 college programming. Each year, another 100 PVNC students participate in Red Seal trade-based co-op placements with a local employer. PVNC has made it a top-priority to continue to build partnerships with industry leaders to allow for increasing student co-op opportunities.

Welding Infrastructure

Upon learning that the province of Ontario is facing an extreme shortage of welding technicians, PVNC has been making improvements to welding education a high priority. In partnership with industry and the Canadian Welding Bureau Foundation, our Board has upgraded welding facilities in all six PVNC secondary schools, bringing our total number of welding booths to 40. All booths are fully equipped with up to date welding machines and apparatus. These enhancements are providing welding programming for Grade 9 to 12 students, as well as providing summer camps and experiential learning opportunities to grades 7 and 8 students.

Furthermore, PVNC staff have been dedicated to improving their own welding abilities for the sake of improving student instruction. Nine PVNC staff have recently obtained two Canadian Welding Bureau professional tickets and our Board is committed to continuing staff welding training annually. PVNC was recently declared a national welding ambassador by the CWB and was invited to speak at the National Welding Educator's Conference in Halifax in 2019.



CNC Technology

While PVNC maintains quality conventional tools and equipment in each of its technology labs, the board has outfitted each school with CNC technology. Each school is equipped with a CNC router table and 3D printers, with some schools having a laser cutter/engraver. This equipment has allowed students to learn modern technological methods in parallel with conventional skill development. This equipment has enabled thriving technological design classes in some of our schools.

Ontario Skills Competitions

PVNC is actively involved with Skills Ontario. Representatives from Skills Ontario visit our intermediate classrooms throughout the Board sharing information about the tremendous opportunities for careers in the skilled trades. Our students are involved with the Skills Ontario Competitions at the junior, intermediate and secondary levels. Ten teams of elementary students compete in the Cardboard Boat Races in Belleville each year. Our Board runs qualifying competitions in Robotics for our elementary students with the winning teams attending the Skills Ontario Competition in May at the Toronto Congress Centre. PVNC secondary students train throughout the year to compete in individual carpentry, team of two carpentry, team of four home building, and the individual electrical competitions at the provincial competitions in May.

Annual PVNC Math Olympics brings out top mathletes and problem-solvers

More than 250 students from Catholic schools across the Board competed for top honours at the 12th annual Ontario Mathematics Olympics during three days of competition at the Catholic Education Centre in April 2019.



Problem solving was the focus of the day. Students exercised creative thinking and exploration using hands-on materials. In some events, students competed in mixed grade pairs, while in other events they competed as a team of four.

Schools in all four regions of the board – Peterborough, Northumberland, Clarington, and the City of Kawartha Lakes – sent teams of four students to compete for the championship in each division (Grade 3&4, Grade 5&6 and Grade 7&8).

The event consisted of four events that span all five strands of mathematics: number sense, patterning and algebra, geometry, data management and measurement.

"The Math Olympics gives students the opportunity to showcase their mathematical thinking while spending a fun day engaged in collaborative problem solving," said student achievement consultant Sandra Connolly.

Holocaust survivor Max Eisen speaks with PVNC students as they prepare to visit concentration camps in Europe

Holocaust survivor Max Eisen told a group of PVNC students and educators in July that visiting Auschwitz and bearing witness to the Holocaust will be among the most important things that they do in their lives.

This summer, Director of Education Michael Nasello and a group of educators led a group of more than 30 students to Germany and Poland. PVNC offers a Holocaust in History and Living Memory Program. Secondary school students work toward two senior credits by attending classes on weekends and in the summer, before travelling to Holocaust sites in Germany and Poland.



A day before their departure, the class welcomed Eisen to St. Stephen Catholic Secondary School where he spoke for more than two hours about his experience. Eisen's book *By Chance Alone* recently won CBC's Canada Reads competition this summer. His book is one of the compulsory works in the program.

"It is one of the most important things you do in your life," Eisen told the students. "You're going to a place that is unimaginable and it's very deceiving. When you are there, try to imagine you are there when I was there in 1944."



Junior teams compete in Board-wide robotics competition

Coding, problem-solving and team work was at its best as 20 junior teams put their robotic talents to the test during two days of board-wide robotics competition in late February 2019.

Eight teams from Catholic elementary schools in Northumberland and Clarington competed at St. Stephen Catholic Secondary School on Feb. 27 and 12 teams from Peterborough & Country and Kawartha Lakes competed on Feb. 28 at St. Peter Catholic Secondary School.

Deep Learning project leads to new outdoor learning space, garden at Immaculate CES

With an oversized pair of scissors came an oversized roar as Immaculate Conception Catholic Elementary School in East City Peterborough celebrated the ribbon cutting of the school's new outdoor classroom and garden space.

What began as a Deep Learning inquiry by a group of Grade 8 students dubbed the Be Well group, culminated in a series of student accomplishments throughout the year.

First there was the Be Well Physical group, which spearheaded active school travel, intramural sports, bike rodeos and other physical activities throughout the year. Then there was the Be Well – A Caring Education group, which focused on spreading self-regulation and mindfulness activities. Finally, there was the Be Well Nature group, which tapped into a partnership with Peterborough Green Up and a Trillium Foundation Grow Grant to plan and design an outdoor classroom and garden space along with the Board's facility services.

"An environment that fosters mindfulness is what the outdoor classroom is all about, and in the future, our prime focus will be just that," explained Grade 8 student Autumn Konkle, in front of a crowd that included MPP Dave Smith, Director of Education Michael Nasello, Peterborough city councilor Gary Baldwin, classmates, teachers, school and Board administrators and community partners.



PVNC establishes new adult education program

In early 2019, Jason Cymbaluk, a 35-year-old father-of-four, noticed a flyer in the staff room at McCloskey International that peaked his interest.



"Want to be a high school graduate?" the flyer read.

He did. Over the years, Cymbaluk had made inroads into earning his high school diploma, but he could never seem to get the last credit he required. Now, through a partnership with his employer and the Peterborough Victoria Northumberland and Clarington (PVNC) Catholic District School Board, Cymbaluk had the opportunity to earn his last credit while working full time at his job in the company's motor component unit.

He jumped at it, and in June 2019 Cymbaluk attended a graduation ceremony, threw his cap in the air, and became the first graduate of the Board's new adult education program.

Since then, PVNC has opened the door for dozens of adult learners seeking to obtain their High School Diploma (OSSD) through the Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR) program.

"It was definitely pretty cool to actually be able to throw the cap in the air and say 'it's done,'" Cymbaluk said. Congratulations Jason!

In addition to attending regular Board meetings, Fisher and Hill lead the Board's Student Liaison Committee, a group of 12 students, including a junior and senior member from each of the Board's secondary schools, that meets monthly alongside Board administration to facilitate student leadership initiatives at the secondary level.

In 2019, the Student Liaison Committee hosted its annual student leadership retreat under the theme "Voices that Grow" that was meant to inspire students to examine personal growth and communal growth and how that fits into environmental growth.

About 100 students from all six PVNC secondary schools attended to listen to keynote presentations and to take part in a range of breakout sessions and workshops meant to give professional development and inspiration for work they can do at their individual schools.

PVNC schools earn Platinum, Gold, Silver and Bronze designations as Ontario EcoSchools



From energy conservation to environmentally-focused classroom lessons, PVNC students are going green. In the 2018-19 school year, 12 PVNC schools were certified with the Ontario EcoSchools program.

Holy Cross Catholic Secondary School earned the top designation as a Platinum EcoSchool.

Five schools have also been designated Gold, four Silver and two Bronze.

Ontario EcoSchools works with 58 school boards to nurture student leadership and foster environmental learning and action in school communities. Certification is based on a provincial standard of excellence and reaches 1,000,000 students across Ontario. PVNC is proud to be part of this growing network, and supports ongoing environmental practices in our schools.

Caring and Safe Schools Week puts focus on kindness

PVNC students take in 75th anniversary D-Day ceremony in France

Arriving in Normandy, France to take part in the 75th commemoration of D-Day on June 6, 2019, a group of PVNC students and educators described what it was like to stand on Juno Beach and take in the experience.

"The ceremony on Juno Beach was absolutely breathtaking," said Isabel Vega, a Grade 11 student at St. Stephen Catholic Secondary School in Bowmanville.

"I remember when my parents had taught my brother and I about World War II and about what had happened overseas. Learning about it from books and TV documentaries was the best I thought it could be, but actually being on the beach, standing where these soldiers fought and fell will always be the most meaningful memory to me. When you walk the sands of Juno, they walk with you."

A group of 44 PVNC students from St. Stephen CSS, St. Thomas Aquinas CSS in Lindsay and St. Peter CSS in Peterborough along with their chaperones began their European tour in Amsterdam before making their way into France where they visited monuments in Dunkirk and Dieppe among other important sites.

On June 6, 2019, the students arrived at Juno Beach to take part in D-Day ceremonies. Seventy-five years ago, on June 6, 1944, 14,000 Canadian assault troops stormed Juno Beach in Normandy as part of the Allied invasion.

The first Catholic elementary school in Lindsay was constructed in 1845 in a log church at the south west corner of Russell and Lindsay streets. In 1868-1869 a new school was built on the same site and named St. Dominic, where both girls and boys were taught until the girls were moved to a new school – St. Mary – under the tutelage of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

In 1994, PVNC built and opened St. Dominic CES in its current location. It opened to 370 students. A refurbished bell from the old St. Dominic building hangs in the front hall of St. Dominic today.

PVNC develops handbook, video to encourage Christian meditation




It's recess time at Holy Family Catholic Elementary School and from the window of the second floor classroom, you can hear the sound of the schoolground roar, that distinct combination of sounds as students gather and play in the waning days of the school year.

Despite the noise outside, the classroom is still. It's dark. Somebody has turned off the lights. Students sit in their desks, eyes closed, peaceful. One student explains the process of meditation including the interior mantra, *Ma-ra-na-tha* (Come Lord Jesus)." The goal is to connect with God, he explained.

When Holy Family began offering opportunities throughout the week for students to participate in Christian meditation, the students and staff involved say they tapped into a need at the school they didn't even know existed.

Students and staff at the school took part in creating a video highlighting the school's approach, which has since been used to promote the practice Board-wide along with a centrally produced Christian meditation handbook.

Student Achievement (EQAO Results)



PVNC Grade 9 EQAO math results higher than provincial average

The Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) released 2018-19 results for primary and junior assessments in reading, writing and mathematics, Grade 9 assessments in academic and applied mathematics and the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test.

The Peterborough Victoria Northumberland and Clarington (PVNC) Catholic District School Board is pleased that results for both the Grade 9 academic and applied mathematics assessments show our Grade 9 students are continuing to perform above the provincial average. In the applied math results, our board-wide average (59%) was 15 percentage points higher than the provincial average (44%) and our board-wide average in the academic results was 88% compared to the provincial rate of 84%.


The EQAO math results for PVNC's primary (Grade 3) and junior (Grade 6) assessments were down from the previous year, as was the trend across Ontario. Provincially, the percentage of Grade 3 and Grade 6 students meeting the provincial math standard has decreased over the last five years. Our primary results were down from last year to 52% and our junior results were down to 36%. Both those averages remain lower than the provincial average (58% for primary and 48% for junior) showing an area that requires continued support.

"We are pleased to see our Grade 9 math results continue to surpass the provincial average, however, we share the concern that primary and junior math scores across Ontario continue to decline," Director of Education Michael Nasello said. "The Ministry of Education is focused on ensuring students have a strong understanding of the fundamentals of math and as a board we are ensuring our educators have the necessary mathematics support and resources remains one of our top priorities."

The Board's results in primary reading and writing show results on par or slightly below the provincial average, while results in junior reading and writing are five percentage points lower than the provincial average. Results from the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) indicate that 75% of PVNC's participating students were successful on their first attempt.


